# Changing Local Attitudes and Behaviour Towards Elephants in Kerala, India

The International Elephant Foundation IEF sponsored an educator skills training workshopentitled "Changing local attitudes and behavior towards elephants in Kerala, India to mitigate conflict between man and elephant" and two awareness programmes. The training workshop was hosted by the Centre for Wildlife Studies, Kerala Veterinary and Animal Sciences University, Pookode, Wayanad, Kerala from 12-14 October 2012. Dr. Leo Joseph, Dean, College of Veterinary and Animal Sciences, Pookode and Mr. S. Sreekumar, Wildlife Warden, Wayanad Wildlife Sanctuary inaugurated the workshop in the presence of Dr. George Chandy and Dr. A. K. Lala of the Centre for Wildlife Studies. Dr. Gigi K. Joseph, Nirmala College, Muvattupuzha, Ernakulam and the authors were the resource and trainers for this programme. 38 educators from HECx areas of Palakkad, Wayanad and Chalakkudi districts in Kerala attended this threeday programme.

Kerala, which has the second highest number of elephants in south India is reporting HEC and it is in increasing trend. The mitigation measures presently in use are failing and the people who live in the fringe areas of the Western Ghats are losing tolerance leading to the death of animals and in certain cases people as well. The human population explosion and the other factors have led to large amounts of land, which was once the range of elephants being taken over by people. When there was more land and less people, humans and elephants perhaps met less frequently. When elephants felt secure in their habitat without having to struggle for food and space, or to avoid human predators, the behaviour of the elephants were likely to have been less confrontational and more evasive also. It is the nature of wild animals to avoid conflict more than to engage in the same, unless there is a problem. HEC is not going away and the only present option left is Co-existence. Bringing in some attitudinal change in the minds of the people of HEC areas will help to understand the animal and thereby avoid conflicts.

The objective of the workshops was to educate all the people living in or near elephant habitats of Palakkad, Wayanad and Chalakkudi districts in Kerala, South India to improve their attitudes towards wild elephants so as to avoid confrontation and conflict whenever possible.

With this objective, the project provided teaching tools, education materials and dynamic training for the teachers, village heads, ngos, forest department staff and volunteers who live in the HEC areas so that they can spread the message and educate others. Zoo Outreach Organization Trust has developed a teaching guide on Human-Elephant CoeXistence (HECx) entitled 'Getting along with elephants" and educational packets for use during the programmes. The

active learning tools employed in the teaching materials help them to find a partial solution on learning to coexist peaceably as proven in other HEC areas in India, Bangladesh, Nepal, Bhutan, Thailand and Indonesia.

As per the objectives of the project the trainees were taught with a variety of attractive, effective and meaningful learning techniques that would help to change the attitude of the people towards problem elephants and try to coexist with them instead of fighting. The feedback from the participants gives strong indications that the

project has been successful, due to involvement and active participation from different human conflict areas of Kerala thereby changing their attitude. At the end of the workshop each participant received about 100 'ele-kit' packets to use with their audience.

The participants were evaluated by using a form to know about their views on workshop content, design, facilitation, delivery and application of design and also their attitude towards elephants before and after the workshop. Their answers were summarized. They were also asked about their open comments about the workshop. From the evaluation results and their comments we understand that the workshop was great success in achieving its goal. Mrs. C. V. Shanthy, Principal, Jawahar Navodaya Vidyalaya distributed the certificates to the participants.

# Two HECx Awareness Programmes at local schools

After the training workshop, two HECx awareness programmes were conducted involving the participants who attended the workshop. The first programme was organized at Jawahar Navodaya Vidyalaya, Lakkidi on 15 October 2012 and another one was held at Silent Valley Model Residential School, Mukkali, Attappady on 31 October 2012. Six trainees coordinated the entire programme at different times. At Jawahar Navodaya Vidyalaya 120 students of age 14 - 16 attended

and at Silent Valley Model Residential School 100 girl students participated and another 120 students remained as observers.

All these students hail from high human elephant conflict areas with rich experience related to HEC problems. The students were briefed about the reasons for human-elephant conflict and told of ways to coexist with them. Elephant characteristics activity from the HECx teaching guide was done in order to understand elephant's body weight, running and walking speed, sense organs and communication skills, etc. Do's and don'ts in elephant habitat was also explained to them in detail using the booklet so as to save their life whenever they had to confront elephants. Then ele-kit packet items were demonstrated. Few students were asked to read aloud the elephant etiquette booklet to other students to hear, then they tied the elephant rakhi (wrist-band) to each other, wore the head band and elephant masks and took an oath to coexist with elephants.

# Participant's HECx Programme report

As they committed in the workshop the participants conducted their own HECx awareness programmes. Two participants (Suresh & Askar Ali) who are teachers at Jawahar Navodava Vidyalaya, Lakkidi conducted an awareness programme. Here is their report: - One-day workshop on Human Elephant Conflict HEC organised by Jawahar Navodaya Vidalaya Lakkidi, Wayanad for the students of WMO English Academy, Sulthan Batheri, Wayanad. Sri Joshi teacher of the school brought forty-eight students and 4 teachers. Students were divided into various groups and acted a role-play to save and protect the elephants. All the students actively participated in the role-play and they also asked many questions about Asian elephants and the future of elephant's life in the world. Sri Aneesh a journalist of Mathrubhumi also witnessed the programme. We also took the students to the forest to study and understand the natural ecosystem of the animals. Sri. Minil Kumar G, PGT Bio and Sri Suresh T C M, TGT Social Science took class on various subjects like human elephant conflict, coexistence and sustainable development.
